What's My Job - Trustee Training Information on how to be an outstanding library trustee

"The responsibilities of trustees are few in number but broad is scope," states Jerry Nichols in the *Handbook for Public Library Trustees*. One way to understand that scope is the New York State Minimum Standards for Public Libraries. These standards address many of the things trustees must do to insure the future of their libraries. New York State is currently updating these minimum standards. Many of the proposed changes to the standards emphasize the importance of the role of the library board in planning, evaluation, policy development and advocacy. Make sure your library board is well versed on the New York State Minimum Standards for Public Libraries. Work with your Director and with MVLS to make sure your library is exceeding these standards and excelling in providing library services to your community.

Policy Update

Help in keeping your policies current

The policy topic of the season this fall is Library Use Policies. These policies address on-site use of library facilities and services. Just as Circulation Policies set the rules and conditions for how community residents can get a library card and borrow materials from the library, Library Use Policies address how the community can use the library building. The three most common individual policies that make up Library Use Policies are Library Behavior Policies, Meeting Room Use Policies and Display & Public Notice Policies. For this article, we are focusing on Library Behavior Policies or Library Rules.

One of the biggest challenges in developing the rules for library use is to keep the list positive and short. It is impossible to list every prohibited behavior, and who wants to say "NO!" all of the time? In our region, both the Albany and Saratoga Springs public libraries have successfully developed statements on library use that meet this challenge. See their policies at:
