Summer Reading Challenge Instructions 2015

- 1. Readers in Grades 1-5 can sign up beginning June 22.
- 2. Fill out child's name and other information on the sign-up sheet. Challenge yourself! How many days will you read this summer? Put the number of days in the Challenge column.
- 3. Give each child an "Every Hero Has A Story" reading log and a sheet of mini-stickers. They put their name on the reading log and will <u>take it home</u> to keep track of their reading. Tell them they will need to bring it back to the library each time they collect a prize.
- 4. Readers put a sticker on for each day they read. Prizes are awarded for every 5 stickers. When they have 5, 10, 15, etc. stickers they bring the reading log back to the library to collect a prize. Staff will draw a slash over each sticker counted, date it and indicate when a prize is awarded. Please indicate prize 1, prize 2, prize 3,etc. Please initial the log to indicate they received a prize.

They have their choice of prize at each prize level.

If they reach their challenge goal they earn a raffle ticket for an end-of-summer prize give-away. Once they reach their challenge goal they can re-challenge themselves but they only get 1 raffle ticket.

- 5. After 5 stickers they also receive a coupon for a free child's admission to miSci. After 10 stickers they receive a Whitney Bookstore coupon.
- 6. Put the filled out raffle ticket in the bucket marked "children's raffle".

Learning styles and boys



Every person has different preferred learning styles!

- Boys tend to show strength in spatialmechanical tasks
- Boys are energized and motivated by movement
- Spatial-visual tools (pictures/graphics)

More on Differentiation!

What is it?

- 1. Plan programs with different learning styles in mind.
- 2. Continually assess

Positives:

- 1. When students are given more choice they take on more responsibility for their own learning.
- 2. Kids will be more engaged in learning if it is at their level.
- 3. The more engaged a group is the less likely you will encounter discipline problems.

Drawbacks:

1. Differentiated instruction requires more work during planning.

What to do if your boys dominate a program!

- Discuss with the entire group expected behavior
- Do this at the start of *every* program
- Take control and ask to hear from other children specifically
- Break children into Groups for program
- Mindful grouping (especially if you know the kids)
