Throughout the year, MVLS supported member libraries as they explored the meaning and implementation of 'fine free', switched their biggest book vendor, developed sustainability through the 21st Century Library planning, advocated locally for fiscal stability through levy votes, and searched for new directors. And let us not forget switching delivery companies. Joint Automation moved the Polaris database to a hosted service, implemented cloud-based file sharing, and e-card registration. All proactive, positive steps that make member library service to their communities easier and more secure.

On the MVLS Board, Anthony Gaddy representing Schenectady County stepped down and Christine Witkowski took his seat. They each have unique perspectives and their viewpoints add important contributions to committee and board discussions.

I would like to send warm thoughts to my former colleagues, Eric Kass - Fort Hunter Free Library, Sherry Kirshman - Frothingham Free Library, Fonda, and Hannah Stahl, Canajoharie Library. To Devon Hedges, formerly of The Community Library, Cobleskill, and now at Schenectady County Public Library, I wish good luck with the next chapter of life. And finally, I welcome Kaitlyn Forbes, Canajoharie Library, Judi Steiger, Fort Hunter Free Library, Shannon Aldi-Hogan, Frothingham Free Library, Fonda, and Kim Zimmer, The Community Library, Cobleskill. I hope you find your time within MVLS as rewarding as I have.

On that note, I want to thank everyone in the MVLS family for their support throughout my time as Liaison to the MVLS Board from Director's Council, President and Vice President of the Board and Director of the Gloversville Public Library. My terms of service are up on the MVLS Board and in December I ended my time with the Gloversville Public Library. When I accepted a part-time position in 1998, I needed a J-O-B and never imagined it would lead to such an exciting and satisfying career. Through all the challenges Gloversville Public Library faced there were teams of dedicated individuals to share the work, the fears, and the joy. DIRECTOR'S REPORT

MVLS libraries have always been at the center of their communities. Most libraries were organized by community minded local leaders who saw the need for an organization devoted to enhancing the educational, civic and recreational opportunities in their villages, towns or cities. And in the Mohawk Valley's many localities, MVLS libraries have been fostering those community values ever since.

In 2019, our libraries made great strides in providing those community-building library services. Several MVLS libraries are seeing increased library borrowing, and nearly every library continues to see growth in the use of e-resources. Library classes and events, use of libraries for meetings and community events, and use of library wireless internet connectivity are also growth areas for MVLS as a whole. And these sterile numbers don't begin to tell the story of how our libraries impact lives. Every day, our libraries make a difference; and these demonstrations of impact illustrate that together, our libraries are serving and building their communities.

In spite of all of this activity and growth, it is easy for communities to take libraries for granted. Libraries need to continually tell their story and to provide the public with the data and stories that present libraries as they are: as the centers of vibrant, resilient communities. MVLS is eager to assist libraries with community engagement projects and efforts. Whether it is social media messaging, video projects, or community listening sessions, MVLS can help libraries shine as community leaders.

In May 2020, as this 2019 report is being compiled and presented, the Covid-19 pandemic shutdown is having a profound impact on communities and libraries. While this interruption in ordinary library activity is a challenge for all, it also provides a clear demonstration of value of libraries, both in what libraries are able to do, and in what our communities are missing while libraries are physically closed. Users are clearly missing the browsing, borrowing, gatherings, social interactions, classes and events that libraries ordinarily provide. But they are also appreciating the e-resources, curated information, virtual events and video storytimes that libraries are providing through the shutdown. Now as in all times, libraries are demonstrating their impact.

And that provides an illustration of another library characteristic: libraries are resilient. As we navigate through these challenges, MVLS will stand with Mohawk Valley libraries as we continue to position libraries as the key to educated, engaged and resilient communities.

THIS YEAR AT MVLS......

Technology & Resource Sharing

- Partnered with the Southern Adirondack Library System to provide automation services and training to member libraries
- Provided support and training for all libraries in Polaris modules including circulation, acquisitions, serials, reports and inventory manager, meeting local needs in member libraries
- Maintained the bibliographic database and provided cataloging for all member libraries
- Supported electronic ordering, invoicing, and processing for 8 member libraries, creating efficiencies for members
- Acted as portal for NOVEL Databases
- Worked with Joint Automation Staff to address Public Access Catalog issues and enhancements
- Maintained collection of over 1900 children's holiday books, available to supplement member library collections and meet local seasonal demands
- Worked with publishers to provide over 2,000 teen and children's materials for preview, delivered to member libraries. Offered publisher's materials to member libraries and branches through preview, workshop and MVLS Bookapalooza events
- Updated graphic novel rotating collections through \$750 Stewart's Shop Grant
- Legos, Duplos, and other STEM equipment were used by 17 libraries and branches supporting STEM classes for youth
- New titles were added to the book discussion collection. More than 200 book discussion titles were loaned to member libraries
- Coordinated system-wide Overdrive purchase of e-books and e-audiobooks and monitored email support requests from the public
- Coordinated Interlibrary Loan service with the Capital District Library Council
- Delivery Service moved more than 1.4 million items to libraries throughout the region
- Professional collection of books and magazines gives libraries access to current information
- Implemented and promoted *Beanstack*, an online book discovery service for children and families linked to our catalog, including weekly email reading tips and supporting online summer learning and 1000 Books before Kindergarten event curriculums
- Provided RBdigital magazine service for borrowing of electronic magazines, later changed to Overdrive magazines, promoting increased use
- Joint Automation fee structure and budgeting are improved
- Implemented the new e-card registration system and provided training for libraries

Outreach Services

- Held 2 Outreach Advisory Committee meetings to keep the community informed about MVLS services
- NYS Adult Literacy Grant funded dozens of programs on job skills and career resources at member libraries
- Provided over 150 books, a set of encyclopedias and a set of reference books and developed a new agreement for the Hale Creek Correctional Facility

- Provided 2 sessions of the Write For Your Life program at Hale Creek Correctional Facility, a series of 6 writing programs using memoir writing as a way to look at inmates' lives and find ways of developing self-esteem through written expression
- Provided over 700 Interlibrary loans for Hale Creek Correctional Facility
- Provided over 250 books and magazines for Fulton, Montgomery, and Schenectady County Jails
- Updated the large print book collections for circulation to member libraries
- Participated in Re-Entry Day at Hale Creek Correctional Facility to provide information and materials on library services and job seeking services in libraries across New York State
- Participate in the Schoharie County Human Services Coordinating Council and the Grant Committee
- Attend Gateway of Fulton and Montgomery County meetings
- Planned and organized Statewide Outreach Meeting with SALS and UHLS to discuss Public Library System Outreach Services and community engagement for member libraries; gave brief overview of evaluation methods
- Select large print collections for Fulton Center for Rehabilitation, a new association for outreach sites
- Compiled and distributed information on various outreach topics for member libraries

Adult & Youth Services

- Coordinated and promoted programs for NYSCA funded Books à la Carte, over 150 people attending, 9 libraries participating
- Coordinated and promoted programs for NYSCA funded Authors Among Us, over 70 people attending, 4 libraries participating
- Library Moon Walk worked with SALS and UHLS to implement and complete this National Network of Libraries of Medicine Grant which provided continuing education, networking with community health organizations, promotion, materials and public programming for 23 libraries on the topic of consumer health. We developed a webinar with NNLM which attracted 76 viewers
- Promoted and helped to coordinate Adult Program Swaps among MVLS, UHLS, and SALS
- Worked with the CA\$H Coalition in Schoharie County to help libraries provide computers, software, and copies of returns for income tax filing

 where teens read a featured title and pass on to their peers who continue the cycle of
 reading and sharing, held at 4 member libraries and branches

- Provided children's and teen books for Summer Learning Event Raffles at member libraries and branches
- Held Performers' Showcase to assist libraries with Summer Learning Curriculum Programming

MVLS Impact Statement

The Mohawk Valley Library System saves taxpayer's money by delivering services, vision and expertise to public libraries and communities in the Mohawk Valley. MVLS services allow member public libraries to meet the needs of over 145,000 active library users, providing free education, low-cost recreation and economic development in our four county service area. Community members visited their public libraries 1 million times in 2018, borrowing more than 1.4 million library items. Over 300,000 computer sessions were facilitated and over 90,000 attended classes and events. These library activities promote community engagement, foster civic responsibility and enhance overall quality of life in our communities.

MVLS engenders efficiency and collaboration in public libraries by providing opportunities for libraries to share resources, provide services and innovate with technology. Virtually all books and other library materials are shared among libraries in the four counties through the system's integrated computer system and delivery service. In 2018 more than 210,000 items were accessed through this collaborative service. All 14 libraries participate in the shared computer services which provide network security and administration, full computer support and cooperative purchasing. More than 650 library leaders attended MVLS continuing education sessions, and more than 25,000 consultation contacts provided libraries with expertise in meeting service, administrative and technology challenges. This menu of services saves member libraries more than \$500,000 each year, and provides the public with a degree and quality of library service that would not be possible without this collaboration.
