Kits are a hit!

At the end of each year, we have the opportunity to review the statistics for all of the great resources we loaned to member libraries. 2024 had a big boost in circulation of program resources and kits: 466 loans for the year! Science kits were especially popular this year, with 90 loans.

It is no surprise that the Big Play kits are the most popular, with a total of 96 loans. These Big Play kits are designed with baby to pre-K age groups in mind. Here is the list of Big Play kits, in order of highest usage:

Big Play Blocks -- Big Play Grocery
Big Play Indoor Playground -- Big Play Build
Big Play Tiny Tots -- Big Play Colors
Big Play Motor Skills-- Big Play Sensory
Big Play Unsandbox

INTRODUCING MYTURN

Replacing KitKeeper for loanable resources.

Earlier in the fall, Plymouth Rocket, the vendor who provided the KitKeeper software that we used for managing loans and reservations for all our fun stuff like Legos, Big Play and STEM kits, craft, outreach, storytime supplies, and more, had a major server migration failure. Those of you who regularly request these items from us noticed an unresponsive system. We were later informed that KitKeeper would no longer be supported and the company folded on 12/31/2024. This is the same company that supported the EventKeeper calendar, which some of our member libraries used. While libraries scrambled to find a replacement for the calendar used to display all of their events, we began the process to find a replacement to KitKeeper. We selected MyTurn as KitKeeper's replacement.

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MyTurn has a much cleaner and more modern interface

Some of the features of MyTurn include unique logins for every user, the ability to view all past, present, and future reservations, and the ability to cancel, edit, and renew items. These are definite improvements that will allow library staff to have more control over their kit reservations. There are currently 161 items available in My Turn with plans to add more in 2025. The process to check out Start With Science kits has not changed; they are still available in Polaris for libraries and patrons with access.

SET SMART GOALS

Although they sounded good at the time, New Year's resolutions usually only last a few weeks.

If you want to try to get more serious about achieving your goals, try setting SMART goals

What is a SMART goal?

Specific - define what will be achieved.

Measurable - how will the goal be measured?

Achievable - how will the goal be achieved?

Relevant - how does the goal relate to the overall objective?

Time Bound - set a deadline to meet the goal.

Example:

- Set an objective to improve employee
 morale
- Start with a specific goal of having bimonthly employee gatherings.
- Poll the staff and gather ideas such as bring in a yoga instructor, host a staff trivia night, etc
- Plan to schedule a specific number of gatherings.
- Set a deadline to schedule the gatherings and communicate these to the staff.
- After the first gathering, measure feedback from staff that attended and adjust accordingly.
- Determine if this gathering had a positive impact on the overall goal to improve employee morale.

Great job! Now move on to your next goal!

Novel NY, also known as Gale Resources is a database all of our member libraries have access to for free. This was made available by state funding of \$3 million in 2025. NYLA is advocating for \$3.1 million in 2026 to ensure this resource is not lost.

New York Library Association (NYLA) Budget Requests

State Aid for Libraries (Operating Aid): \$176.8 million This request represents the \$76 million statutory value for State Aid for Libraries in FY 1991 – 1992, the first year of modern operating aid, adjusted for 2024 using the Consumer Price Index.

NYS Library Construction Aid: \$175 million

This investment is needed to sustain and improve New York State libraries' physical infrastructures to provide a safe, accessible, and sustainable environment.

Library Materials Aid: \$11.33/pupil

NYLA is advocating for the first increase in Library Materials Aid since 2007. The cost of school library materials has increased substantially and since 2023 electronic and digital materials have been included in these costs without an increase in funding.

NOVELny: \$3.1 million

NYLA requests another year of dedicated funding from the state for NOVELny. This amount will allow this resource to continue for another year - FY 2026. NOVELny is a curated collection of databases made available to school, public, and academic libraries as a resource for access to reputable information.



TRUSTEE CORNER

Upcoming board training opportunity

NYLA's 2025 Policy Initiatives:

Freedom to Read

§ Freedom to Read Act (School): <u>S.6350-B</u> / <u>A.6873-B</u> Libraries across New York face rapidly expanding efforts to censor materials and programming. We require legislation that empowers library professionals to exercise their expertise to curate and develop collections and provide public access to materials, services, and programs.

Open Shelves

S.1100 (May) A.3119 (Kelles) - NYLA Memo of Support Continued support by legislation that ensures library staff are allowed to curate and develop collections, services, and programming that reflect the interests of all people of the community that the library serves.

Protection in Public Libraries

§ Protection in Public Libraries: S.7677-A / A.7843-B

E-Books Licensing Reform

Legislation is required to allow library access to electronic books and digital audiobooks, providing requirements for contracts between libraries and publishers for access to electronic library material.

Media Literacy

§ S.6868-A / A.10544

NYLA supports efforts to advance Media Literacy education in New York State schools and to ensure Certified Library Media Specialists are using their training and experience to lead Media Literacy efforts in schools statewide.

The Community Library offered a fun Scavenger Hunt with a special bonus available on Saturday, 2/1. The Scavenger Hunt will continue through the month of February.



AI SCAMS WARNING

From the Tech Tutor

It's important to stay up-to-date on the latest scams. Many times scammers prey on the most vulnerable and try to fool people with intimidation and urgency. Scammers use email, phone, and text messages to initiate a scam. These scams can involve clicking on a link, requests for personal information, or demands for money.

Here are some helpful tips to avoid falling victim to scams:

- Ignore calls from Unknown callers
- Delete or Block these numbers
- Listen to your gut, if it sounds like something far fetched, hang up, do not engage with the caller.

Now that Artificial Intelligence (AI) has become more sophisticated, scammers are using these tools to do voice cloning and to make deepfake videos. Voice recordings can be pulled from videos on social media or a recorded phone conversation. Still images can also be used to create a life like replica of someone you know.

In this instance, Stacey received a video call from her friend, Sara, saying her Facebook account had been hacked and asked her to send her an access code. When Stacey sent the code, this initiated an elaborate scam to post multiple items for sale on Stacey's Facebook page. Full story here.

In another example, a scammer used a voice clone to call an unsuspecting individual, disguised as his adult son who said he was arrested. If you have heard of these types of scams from the past, they typically involve someone pretending to be a family member, there is an emotional tug, and a sense of urgency for money. This case was very believable at the time because the voice on the phone was his son. Full story here.

It is recommended to create a code word to use among your family and friends to verify identity. If you ask the person to state the code word and they cannot, hang up.

It is also recommended to lose the sense of urgency, slow down and check on the details provided, even if it may take a few hours.

Additional Social Media Strategy Tips from Marketing Consultant - Bobbi Ryan

- Make sure to include the text in your post that is used on your image. For example - Using this example on the left, the content outlining all of the information about the contest in this image would also be seen as text in the post.
- Like and follow local groups and businesses, then share your posts with these groups.

Bobbi recommends posting consistently - generally 2 posts per week.


