

IS YOUR LIBRARY READY FOR AN EMERGENCY?


If one thing is certain in life, it's that the unexpected happens! In a library this could be anything from a community member or staff member having a medical emergency to a weather event damaging your building. Whether your library is small or large, it's important to be ready to respond so that patrons and staff are safe!

Here are some things to consider when planning to respond to unexpected emergencies:

Go bags – These should include up-to-date schedules, contact information for all staff members and their emergency contacts, as well as, a small first aid kit, a thermal blanket, and a whistle or bullhorn. As an important reminder, these items should be in a bag or bin, ready to take with you in the event of an evacuation.

Evacuation – If you and your staff have to evacuate, do you have a meeting point to ensure everyone made it out safely? Does your staff know how to sweep the building quickly and efficiently to help direct patrons out of the library? Are your exits clearly labeled?

Communications – How will you communicate with staff during the emergency and afterward: text, email, or another means? Do you have a landline in your library to call for help if needed?

Facility – Do all staff keep an eye on the building and grounds for potential safety issues? Do they know the procedures for reporting them?

Who's in charge? Do you have an established "chain of command?" Do staff feel empowered to make decisions in emergencies, especially on evenings and weekends when there is a limited workforce?

Where to go? Sometimes it's safer to stay inside the building. Where is the best location in your building for staff and patrons to shelter in place if needed?

Who to call? Do you have an accessible phone list for local law enforcement/emergency services, and your plumber, electrician, or other important tradespeople?

Equipment – Flashlights are a must, a battery-operated radio can be helpful in the event of a weather-related emergency, especially if the power goes down. Do all library staff know where the fire extinguishers are and how to use them? Where is the first aid kit and where are the supplies if it needs restocking? Do you have a way to block off an area if it needs to be restricted for a time?

Incident Reports - Make sure you are keeping track of any injuries or accidents for insurance purposes.

Steps to Take

- · Review the items above.
- Develop a written safety plan/procedure.
- Train staff on procedures regularly and especially during onboarding.
- Connect with local law enforcement to discuss building safety and training for staff.
- Consider developing policies for unattended children and vulnerable adults so staff know how to respond in these situations.

WAITING ON A BUDGET

NY State budget deadline has passed, still being negotiated.

April is here. Unfortunately, the New York State budget is not.

The Governor and legislative leaders have not reached consensus on multiple policy issues within the budget. As a result, the April 1st deadline is in the rear view mirror, and a budget extender has been passed. Further extenders may be required if the budget continues to be delayed.

In January, the Governor introduced her executive budget proposal with a slight increase in Library Operating Aid and a significant decrease in Library Construction Aid. In March, the State Senate and Assembly shared their one-house budget amendments that proposed increases in library funding. (See the chart below for more details.)

Thank you to all who made the trip to Albany, spoke with legislators, and/or sent messages to advocate for library funding in the state budget.

In recent weeks, the status of the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), a federal government agency that provides funding in support of libraries and museums, has changed dramatically. After a recent presidential executive order, the status of the agency is uncertain, and IMLS staff have been placed on paid leave for up to 90 days.



CHECK OUT GOOGLE LENS

From the Tech Tutor

Google Lens is a visual search tool that can identify what you are looking at and provide search results.



Some of the cool things you can do with Google Lens include:

Identify -

- plants, animals, and other objects.
- products and where to buy them.
- clothing brands suggestions on price and where to buy them.

Translate -

· text from signs and other images.

Explain -

 solves math problems and equations instantly, while providing an explanation of how the problem was solved.

Find Google Lens:

Android phones have the Google app pre-installed - some models even have Google lens included in their camera features. iPhone users will need to download the Google app from the App store.

To get started, open the Google app and tap on the lens icon. Allow the app permission to use your camera. Hover the lens over an image or object and tap on the magnifying glass icon.

An easy test is to aim at your shoe or at a water bottle to see how Google Lens works. To access the interactive lens again, tap on the back arrow at the top of your screen.

To use Google Lens with photos on your smartphone, tap the images icon next to the magnifying glass icon. Allow Google limited or full access to your photos. Tap on a photo, such as a pet, flower, or beach. Expand the lens window if necessary and review the search results. If you allow limited access, you will need to allow access for each image and tap on Edit Selected Photo each time.

Have fun exploring all you can do with Google Lens!


