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Director's Message

How many times have you heard the statement: "it is a challenging time for libraries" over the past year? Certainly, all libraries are facing challenges on multiple fronts. These challenges may feel daunting, unwelcome and distracting, but they also provide a compelling reason to focus on resilience in our libraries. At the same time, they are presenting us with an opportunity to recommit to the values that are at the core of public library services in our communities.

That community value and need for resilience are expressed at the beginning of the MVLS Vision Statement: MVLS libraries are cherished community anchors with secure futures. What do libraries need to become more central to the heart of the community? And how do we make the library's place in the community more secure? I suggest there are four areas of focus in making public libraries more cherished and more secure:

- The library's community impact is obvious and valued
- The library has a sustainable staffing model that builds and grows that impact
- The library has secure funding that is directly supported by the community
- The library building and grounds are sound, secure and well-used

The MVLS goals and services support libraries in each of these four areas. Of course, it is the services that libraries provide, and the community relationships that are forged, that are most central to libraries being more cherished and secure; and so contributing to and growing those services constitutes the core of what MVLS does for member libraries. Several new offerings have been introduced in the past year, including memory care kits, resources for serving neurodivergent and other specific groups, and offerings in AI and other technologies. By working together with system resources and meeting specific local needs, MVLS libraries are having an obvious and valued community impact.

MVLS libraries have also made great strides in moving toward more secure staffing and funding. Libraries have again grown their budgets through successful public budget votes, and more of our libraries than ever before are annually engaging with their community to request secure funding. This helps libraries plan for secure staffing, which includes providing salaries and benefits in line with community norms, as well as having adequate coverage to maintain staffing when illnesses and other emergencies affect staff's ability to continue to serve the community. Finally, it is great to see so many of our libraries building, growing and maintaining the wonderful buildings that contribute to thriving communities.

Yes, libraries are facing challenges. But our MVLS libraries are demonstrating every day that they are cherished anchors, and that they are working toward secure futures. By continuing to work together, we can realize the vision of having all MVLS communities enriched by thriving libraries with secure futures.

MVLS: Mission, Vision, Services & Goals

- MVLS explores, showcases, and champions **library services for children and families**, helping to make early literacy, family literacy, children's, and teen services expected, available and appreciated by all.
- MVLS facilitates and provides **programs for adult learners** with emphasis on assisting libraries and library users with changing technologies to help bridge the digital divide.
- MVLS assists library staff and trustees with expertise, vision and innovation offered through continuation education and consultation, to empower libraries to transform communities.
- MVLS **connects libraries through networking**, information exchange and collaboration to build community and broaden horizons; connecting libraries with one another, with the wider library community, government agencies, and interest groups.
- MVLS **promotes and celebrates library services** throughout our 4 counties and in New York State, helping libraries communicate impact and value.




